A love for music inherited from his father A. Clyde Kreider Sr. have won for Clyde a spot in the Solanco High School band for four years. He has been a member of the senior chorus at the school and sang in FFA groups in the chapter. At the State FFA chorus where he sang three different years he was chosen to sing with the National chorus at Kansas City.

Clyde was one of the leaders in the Junior Play, sentinel and treasurer in the local chapter and chaplain and treasurer in the county association FFA.

Ray has held the offices of secretary, reporter, and president of the local chapter, being elected secretary twice in the four years in school. At present he is junior advisor of the local chapter FFA.

His farming program includes two dairy cows, 1 1/2 acre of squash, and 1 1/2 acres of field corn.

Activities in the FFA include his office as Reporter in the local chapter, membership on the parliamentary procedure team that won the county contest, and junior advisor to the junior FFA Club.

He is a member of the adult Ayrshire committee at the Lampeter fair and the Willow Street United Church of Christ.

BURNELL L. ANDREWS
Burnell is the only Keystone Farmer from Lancaster County this year who is married. Mrs. Andrews is the former Mary Ann McCullough.

Burnell, former president of the Garden Spot chapter FFA, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy K. Andrews, of Lancaster R7.

He was a member of the State FFA band for two years, a member of the school band and a member of the senior chorus at school.

ELWOOD HEISEY
The 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. David Z. Heisey, Manheim R2, is a senior at Manheim Central High School. Elwood is at present the Chaplain of the County Chapter FFA and historian in the local branch. During his 11th grade he served the local chapter as assistant Chaplain.

Roy is a member of the Pequea Valley High School chorus and the track team. He won a trip to the AIC at Illinois State University last

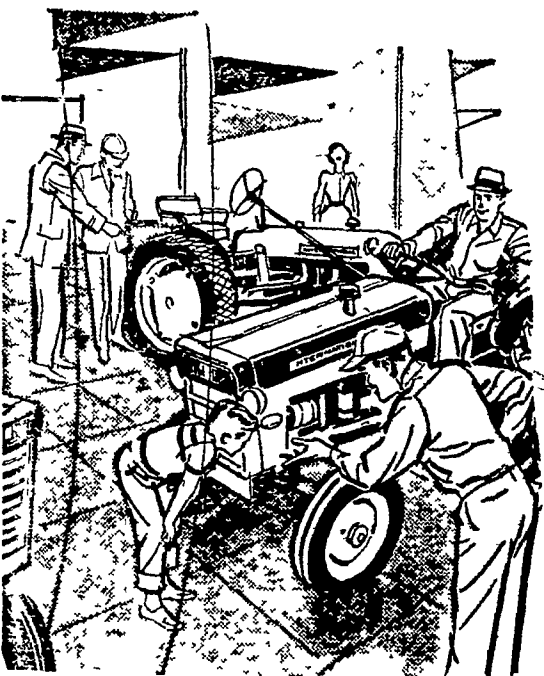
