even package. It is used in tin containers

Packing in nitrogen or treating the nuts with an antioxidant both gives good results. Nuts treated with antioxidants will take nearly three months of shelf life while untreated nuts stay fresh less than a month

Those packed in nitrogen may stay salable even longer. Check packages of shelled nuts when you buy them to see if they have been treated with an antioxidant.

Give nuts the cool dark treatment when you get them home. Pecans tested kept for over a year at refrigerator temperatures

CHOCOLATE COOKIES

2 cups sugar
2 cup lard
2 eggs
1 cup cocoa
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup sour milk
1 cup hot water
2 teaspoons baking soda
4 cups flour
Mix ingredients in order, Put hot water over the cocoa. Bake at once. Drop by teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees)

FILLING

2 egg whites beaten stiff (in a small bowl)
4 tablespoons flour (in a large bowl)
4 tablespoons milk
1 1/2 cups shortening
4 cups confectioner's sugar
4 tablespoons vanilla
Mix ingredients in large bowl and add the egg whites mixing until creamy, about three minutes Put filling between two cookies and press together Makes about fifty

APRICOT COCONUT BALLS
1 1/2 cups dried apricots ground fine
2 cups shredded coconut
1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
Mix everything together, shape into balls and roll in sugar. Yields about three dozen.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup light brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg.

Sift flour, soda, and salt Cream butter peanut butter, sugar, vanilla, and egg. Mix and shape into loaf. Wrap in waxed paper and place in the refrigerator. Slice and bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 375 degrees. Makes about five dozen.
