

and paisleys are available to suit any occasion. When you buy one of these prints — whether cotton, silk, wool, or any of the blends — be sure to choose one that is flattering to you.

The size of the design should be in proportion to your size for the most attractive appearance. Small prints are best for the petite figure; larger designs for the taller figure. The medium-size print with an indefinite outline will be most flattering to the woman of average size.

Never let the design of a print overshadow you. Clothes are most flattering when they serve as a background for your personality. The most flattering fabric for your figure will not make you a well-dressed individual if it is not right for the occasion. Small, neat, conventional prints are preferred for street and afternoon wear, gay, bolder prints are suitable for sportswear and summer party dresses.

**COAT-SHOPPING**

Coat shopping should be done at home. Having what you want in mind before you go shopping will save you time and make you happier with your selection. Take stock of the qualities

you need most in a new coat and the occasions on which you will wear it. Consider the rest of your wardrobe to find what color or colors harmonize with the most of your clothes. This will tell you what colors to look for in your new coat.

Mave your mind made up about the general style you want before you go shopping. Study current styles and colors, keeping your needs in mind. If you intend to wear a coat several seasons, avoid fashion fads that may be short-lived.

In deciding what style is best for you, here are some suggestions. Full, belted or short coats look well only on tall, slim women. A heavy or short woman will look more slender and taller in straight or slightly flared, long coats. Double-breasted styles are for the tall, slim figure; single-breasted coats look best on short, heavy women.

With so much collar and sleeve emphasis this year, these are points to watch. Collars that are high or turned up in back are for the woman with a long neck. Low rolling collars and collarless styles are best for short necks. Full, bulky sleeves broaden, so they are only for the tall, slender woman. More closely fitted

sleeves are better for the short, stout figure.

Look for these marks of quality when shopping for a coat or suit: Look first at the outside of the suit or coat; good quality ones are neatly pressed, smoothly shaped and evenly stitched with perfectly matched threads.

Check workmanship on pocket corners, ends of buttonholes — especially bound ones, and other places likely to get much wear or strain. Bindings of bound buttonholes and pockets should be narrow, squared off securely at the ends, and finely stitched.

Linings and the way they are put in are good quality guides. The lining should be neatly and smoothly fitted with expansion allowance — usually a pleat — in back, and neatly put in with fine stitches around the edges and armholes. Linings in the best coats and suits are tacked securely along shoulder, side and armhole seams to hold the lining in place. Linings that fray easily should have large seam allowances, the seams should be finished with stitching that protects them from later wear and cleaning.

If the coat is open at the lower edge, check the interlining. Often the lining and

interlining are seamed together and installed as one, resulting in bulky seams that cannot be pressed flat, make the coat look untidy, and are uncomfortable for the wearer. The interlining should be tacked securely to the coat seams.

**HOW TO CHOOSE A HAT**

When buying a hat, keep in mind figure, not just your face and hair. Shape of face and hair styles are important, but remember that people will notice your overall appearance; select a hat that is also in proportion to your figure size.

The petite person should wear small hats with dainty trims and materials. A high crown will add inches to the short figure, but such a hat should have small-scale trim-

ming and should be kept in good proportion to the length of figure and face. Large hats usually look out of place on a small person; cartwheel hats, especially, should be avoided if you are small.

Larger women should choose distinctive, becoming hats with some bulk. Profile hats and draped berets are becoming while small, close-fitting hats and pillboxes should not be worn if you have this type figure. A small hat makes a large person look even larger. Avoid tall, narrow hats or very wide brims if you are tall and thin.
