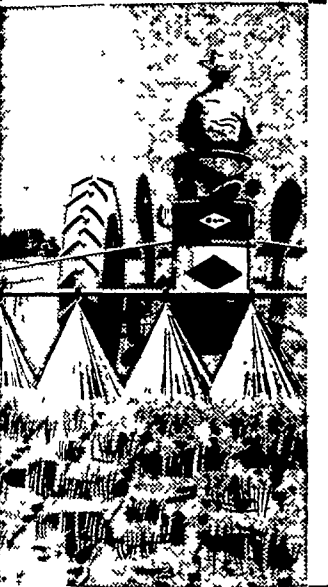

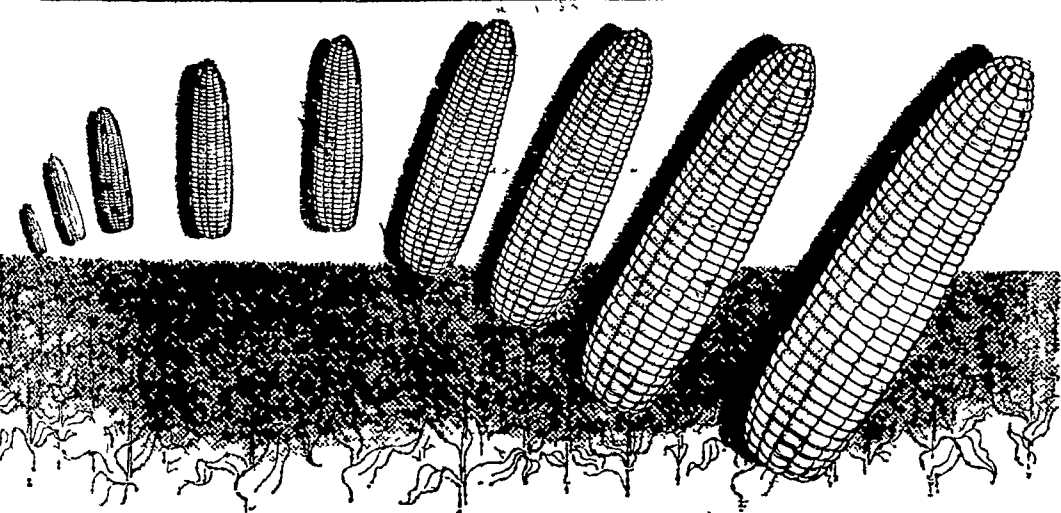


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Illustrated talks showing conservation practices on the land will be presented by members of the SCD at each of the gatherings.

Many of the new cooperators during the past year signed soil conservation agreements as a result of similar watershed meetings.

Some plastic coated, impregnated, or bonded wallpapers are washable with soap and water. They're a good choice for hard duty areas. Other wallpapers must be cleaned with gum base or special dough-type cleaners.

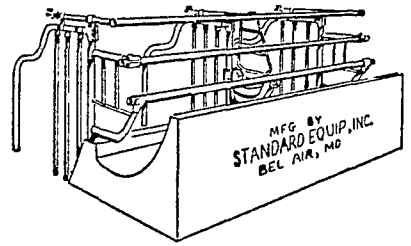
U. S. Dept. of Agriculture studies indicate liming acid soil's sometimes improves the efficiency of fertilizer utilization as much as four times.

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
