Four Herds Tie In Red Rose DHIA

Four herds in the Red Rose Dairy Herd Improvement Association finished the month of March in a tie for first place with an average of 58 pounds of butterfat.

The mixed herd of 278 cows belonging to Edwin J. Landis, Lancaster R7 made the record on 1597 pounds of milk with a 3.7 test. Raymond F. and Louise A. Witmer, Willow Street R1, milked 1127 pound of 5.1 percent milk from their herd of 47. 4 registered Guernseys. Paul B. Zimmerman's 25.2 registered Holsteins at Ephrata R1 made 1523 pounds of 3.8 per cent milk, while the 18 registered and grade Holsteins of Mervin Nissley, of Bainbridge R1 produced 1-457 pounds of milk with 4.0

The high 305 day lactation record was completed by a registered Holstein in the herd of Hiram S. Aungst, of Elizabethtown R1. Cheer produced 18,023 pounds of 3.8 per cent milk for a total of 676 pounds of butterfat.

Second high lactation record was on a registered Holstein owned by James G. Kreider, Quarryville R1. The Kreider cow made 674 lbs.

A total of 34 herds in the association averaged 50 lbs. of butterfat per cow or beiter for the month.
