Winner of the calf is Robert R. Freeman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Freeman of Denver R1. Bob is a sophomore in Vocational Agriculture and president of the local FFA Chapter.

A committee composed of local farmers along with the agricultural teacher read essays entitled "How I Would Raise A Calf" which were submitted by various boys in the agriculture department competing for the calf. Each essay was marked with a number and graded and in this manner the winner was determined.

The new owner will agree to raise the calf according to a plan approved by his teacher of agriculture and when the calf is grown and produces its first female offspring, he will give this offspring back to the FFA chapter and it will be given in a similar manner to some other boy. When this obli-

gation is fulfilled, the owner of the original heifer is free to do as he likes with both the heifer and any future offspring. It is hoped, however, that the heifer will help the boy become established in farming.

GROW SUMMER PASTURE

Sudangrass is our most productive summer annual pasture. John Baylor, Penn State extension agronomist, says it can be planted between late May and late June. One acre will supply excellent grazing for 3 or four mature animals during July and August. Piper is a recommended variety.

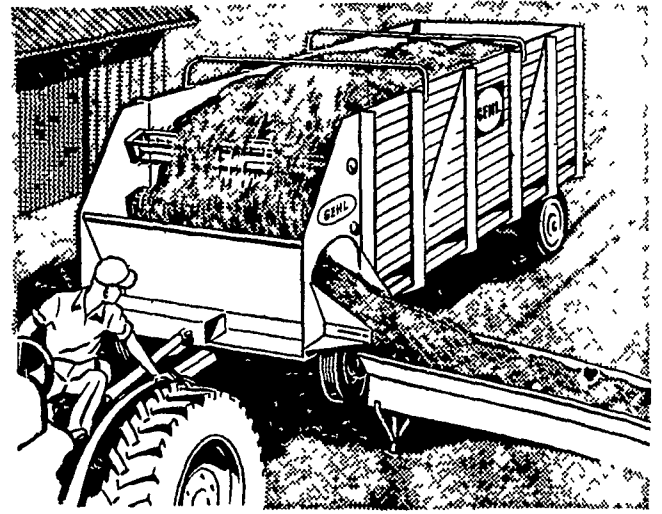
