Steers Unevenly Higher

CATTLE: 2800 compared with 3000 last week. The shortened holiday week's supply includes 55 per cent slaughter steers, 35 per cent stockers and feeders. Trading slow. Compared with last week's close, slaughter steers steady - 50 lower. Cows steady to 25 higher. Bulls steady. Stockers and feeders steady.

Choice grade 1000-1350 lb slaughter steers sold for 26.25 - 28.00, load Choice carrying a Prime end 1431 lbs. 28.25, load and lot 1135-1275 lb. high-Choice 28.50-28.75, while Good and low-Choice slaughter steers brought 23.50-26.25 with Standard down to 21.00.

Good and Choice heifers ranged from 21.50-25.00. Cutter and Utility cows 15.75 - 18.50, Canners and low - Cutters 14.50-15.75. Utility and Commercial bulls 20.00-23.00, Good grade bulls 22-23.75 Medium and Good 600-900 lb. feeder steers 23.50-28.00, few Medium and Good stock calves 27.00-30.00.

CALVES: 550 compared with 512 last week. Trading moderately active. Vealers were steady. Good & Choice vealers brought 27.00-32.00. Choice and Prime 32.00-36. Standard and low-Good 19.27.00, Utility down to 16.00

HOGS: 1100 compared with 1057 last week. Trading was moderately active. Barrows and gilts sold at fully steady rates. Sows strong U. S. 1-2 grade 190-225 lb barrows & gilts sold for 19.00-19.75 with several lots U. S. no 1's 190-225 lbs at 19.75-20.00 U. S. 1-3 grade 190-230 lb butchers 18.50-19.00, mostly 18.75 up. 230-250 lb hogs 18.00-18.50. U. S. 1-3 grade, mostly 2-3, 300-600 lb. sows 11.00-13.50

SHEEP: 250 compared with 417 last week. Trading moderately active. Good and Choice spring lambs 2.00 higher, Utility steady. Good and Choice 60-90 lb. spring lambs sold at 20.00-23.00, while few lots Choice and Prime made 24.00, Utility sold down to 16.00.

Chicago Cattle Receipts Uneven Prices Steady

Receipts for the holiday shortened week were about five per cent below last week. Distribution of receipts very uneven with Tuesday's receipts accounting for 80 per cent of the week's supply and Wednesday's receipts the smallest for any Wednesday since September 1953.

Consist of receipts little changed with 75 per cent slaughter steers, between 15 and 20 per cent heifers and about 5 per cent cows. Vealers and stockers and feeders in very light supply.

Percentage of slaughter steers about like the 4 per cent last week and per cent of choice little changed from last week's 70 per cent. Average weight of slaughter steers a few pounds heavier than the 1155 lb. average last week.

Slaughter steers, good grade and below steady to 25 higher, other kinds steady to strong.

Two loads prime 1333 to 1366 lb. steers 29.50. Load-lots high choice and mixed choice and prime 26.25 to 28.50 with most sales at 26.75 Bulk of the good to average choice steers 22.50 to 26.75. Most average choice from 25.75 to 26.50

Good and choice vealers 24-28 with standard at 18 to 23 A few lots of choice and mixed good and choice 700 to 900 lb feeding steers 24-24.50. A load of good 800 lb feeders at 22. Several loads and lots mostly good 550-675 lb stock steers 24 to 25.00.

Vintage Livestock Slaughter Steers To 1.00 Higher

CATTLE: 1390. Compared with last week, average — Good and better grades of slaughter steers 25-50 higher, low-Good and below fully 1.00 higher. Cows 25-50 higher. Bulls scarce, few sales steady to-strong.

Bulk of the Choice grade slaughter steers 26.25-27.75, few average to high-Choice 1070-1200 lb. 28.10-28.60, Good to low-Choice 23.50-26.25, Standard down to 20. Cutter and Utility cows 16.50-18.60, Canners and low-Cutters 15.50-16.75, Utility and Commercial bulls 20.00-23.00, few Good grade bulls 23.50.

CALVES: 282. Average — Good and better grades of vealers steady. Low-Good & below 1.00 higher. Good and Choice vealers 27.00-32.00, Choice and Prime 32.00-35, Standard and low-Good 23.50 - 26.50.

HOGS: 96. Barrows and gilts 25 higher. U. S. 1-3 grade 205-217 lb. 18.60-19.10, two lots 1-2 grade 182- and 201 lbs. 19.50, lot 1-3 grade butchers 219 lbs. 20.00. Lot garbage fed hogs 2-3 grade 248 lbs. 16.50.

Slaughter steers were unevenly 50 higher at the July 7 sale at the New Holland Sales-Stables. Receipts included 1062 head. Compared to last week cows and bulls were 25 to 50 higher.

Several lots of high choice and prime 950 to 1100 lb. slaughter steers made 28.60 to 29.50 with the bulk of the choice grade cattle at 26.50 to 28.50. Good and low choice were 23.50-26.75 with Standard down to 21.

Standard and low good heifers were 18.75 to 21.50. Cutter and utility cows made 16.75-18.75 with cannery and low cutters at 15.50 to 17. Utility and commercial bulls managed 20.75 to 23.50 while good grade bulls sold at 22.50 to 24.60.

Calves 276. Vealers sold steady to 1.00 higher. Good and choice vealers made 28 to 34. Choice and prime were 34.50 to 36 with a few lots to 37 and 37.50. Standard and low good sold at 24-28 while utility made 21 to 23.50.

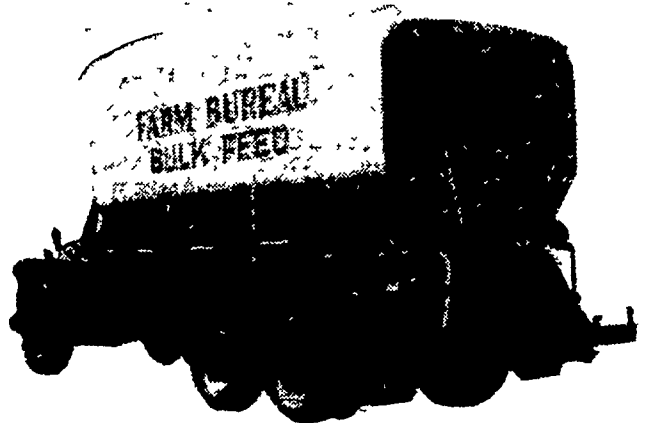
