

Wheat Vote Polls Announced

Polling places for the July 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of wheat were announced this week by Landis G. Becker, Chairman of the Lancaster County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1961 (except growers taking part in the feed wheat program.)

Mr. Becker points out that at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties will apply on "excess" wheat resulting from noncompliance with the farm's wheat acreage allotment, and price supports will be available on the crop at not less than 75 per cent of parity—the exact rate to be announced before the vote.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing, but allotments will remain in effect as a condition for price support at 80 per cent of parity as directed by law.

Wheat growers voting in a referendum each year have approved marketing quotas for the past seven wheat crops.

The wheat quota ballots may be cast on Thursday, July 21 from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the following places: Growers from Conoy, West Donegal, Mt. Joy, East Donegal, West Hempfield and Rapho townships, Red Rose Dairy, 1/2 mile south of Florm.

ferred with transplanting and soggy ground prevented the transplanting when some of the seedlings were ready.

After some fields were planted, cutworms did some damage but most fields took hold nicely. Good planting weather and a rush to get the job finished created a plant shortage that in some cases influenced the farmer to plant the fields to corn or soybeans while other farmers were willing to wait on the plants hoping for some of the unusually good growing weather of last year to push the crop to maturity before frost.

The first estimate of average yield for this year's crop based on growers reports made just before July 1 is 1,550 pounds per acre, the report said.

BLUE COMB

A disease which attacks growing pullets and young laying chickens.

ORIGIN: Not of bacterial origin, but otherwise suggestive of a contagious or infectious disease. Current view point: Probably a virus disease.

SYMPTOMS: Sudden decreased feed consumption, drop in egg production, depression and whitish watery diarrhea. Individual birds may have crop distension, sunken eyes, dark blue combs, shriveled shanks

Post Mortem usually shows pale breast muscle resembling the flesh of fish. Crop is often filled with sour-smelling food. Small yellowish spots may appear on the liver. Enlargement of kidneys is common with the accumulation of urates.

CAUTION: Accurate diagnosis is necessary to differentiate between Blue Comb and Fowl Cholera.

TREATMENT: Several types of treatment formerly recommended have mostly been replaced by the use of the Broad Spectrum antibiotics or a combination of one of these with Furazolidone contained in a highly fortified feed.

For treatment of Growing Pullets we recommend the use of our **EARLY BIRD No. 50 Medicated Ration.**

For treatment of Layers we recommend our **EARLY BIRD No. 49 Medicated Ration**

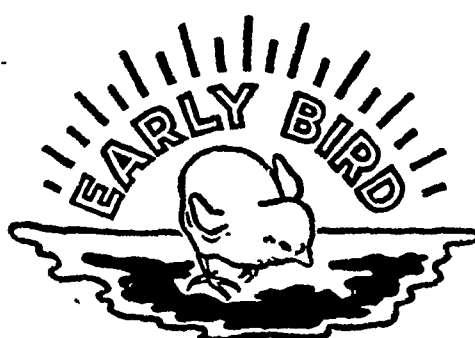

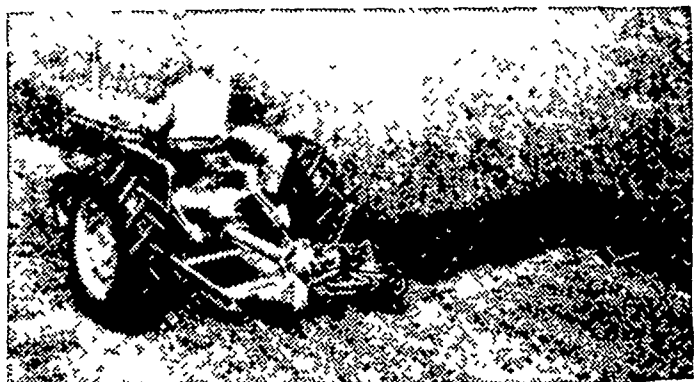
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
