The book reports that about 82 percent of the county was in farmland in 1954. There were 7,951 farms with an average of 62.7 acres in the same year.

General type farms led the parade with 1,915 in this category. Dairying was the most numerous of the specialized farms claiming 1,570 of the total and leading Poultry farms which had a total of 1,170. Of the general farms, only 65 depended primarily on crops while 680 depended primarily on live stock products the latest figures show.

Corn showed up as the most important crop in the county with 102,876 acres planted Most of the crop was used in the livestock programs in the feeding county.

As might be expected, tobacco proved to be one of the important crops with 26,000 acres devoted to the production of sigar leaf. The book reports that Pennsylvania broadleaf type tobacco was developed largely through experiments in the Garden Spot County.
