Check Poultry For Parasites **Experts Suggest**

Summertime is the season when external parasites multiply most rapidly. This is a'so the season when poultivinca are usually the busiort with other jobs on the farm and the little things are often neglected

However many times it is these little things that may cause the most trouble with the laying flock

Checking some sample buds in the laying fock to detect the presence of external parasites should be a weekly choic, say Extension Poultry specialists These litte varmits' can be seen by close observation of the birde And, rust because none (Turn to page 6)
