The 18-year-old farm boy is the 100-acre son of his parents, but saved for a feed firm during the summer to help to pay college expenses the fall term. The scholarship will be paid in two payments. The first, a

\$300 payment to the university, will go toward the first year of schooling. Upon enrollment for his second year, Huber will have another \$200 credited to his account. Presentation of the award was made to Huber at the meeting of the county teachers of vocational agriculture in Manheim high school on Thursday. Presenting the award was Mr. Christ C. Kunzler, of the packing firm. "We have long wanted to show our appreciation for the work of the vocational agriculture program, but it

remained for the teachers to show us the way we could help," Kunzler said in making the presentation. The program was outlined by a committee of teachers and approved by Kunzler with the aim of helping worthy students continue their education beyond high school. The committee was composed of Marlin Hennings, Elizabethtown; Herbert Heberlein, Solanco; and George Myers, Lampeter-Strasburg, all teachers of vocational agriculture. 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1958. The minimum rate may be increased if the final 1960 crop corn support price as determined in October is higher. It will not be reduced. 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**Check Poultry For Parasites Experts Suggest**

Summertime is the season when external parasites multiply most rapidly. This is also the season when poultrymen are usually the busiest with other jobs on the farm and the little things are often neglected. However many times it is these little things that may cause the most trouble with the laying flock. Checking some sample birds in the laying flock to detect the presence of external parasites should be a weekly chore, say Extension Poultry specialists.
