According to the state Election Guide, any qualified registered voter who is unavoidably absent from his home county on election day because of duties, business or occupation may use the absentee ballot.

Electors who are in the county during the 30-day period before the election must apply in person to the chief clerk of the county board of elections and complete the official application, certificate and declaration forms. Applications may be made until seven days before the election.

in October or November, but not later than November 30, seems to be the best recommendation.

Sloat cautioned farmers that forage treated this fall with dieldrin should not be harvested or grazed until the normal time for cutting the first crop next May or June.

Recommendations for control of aphids and leafhoppers will remain the same as in 1960 Sloat said, "That is, methoxychlor for leafhoppers and malathion for aphid. At present time Heptachlor is NOT registered for use on hay crops in Pennsylvania."

Best Food Buys

Autumn Colors Show Up

Autumn is the colorful season throughout our Pennsylvania countryside, observes Tom Piper, Penn State Extension Marketing Agent. Much of this color carries over to the colorful apple displays found at local foodmarkets and roadside stands. Varieties in plentiful supply this week include the popular Stayman, Red and Golden Delicious, York Imperial, and Rome Beauty. Early fall varieties, Smokehouse, Grimes Golden and Jonathan are available in dwindling supply.

Tokay grapes remain on the list of good buys in fruit; supplies of seedless grapes are nearing an end for the season.

Cranberry prices are dropping as supplies increase. Pumpkins and squash are reasonably priced and the season's first persimmons are appearing in some foodmarkets.

Supplies of decorative gourds, Indian corn and chest

nuts are making a first of season appearance.

Cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, cabbage and celery head the list of good buys in vegetables. Onions, white and sweet potatoes, spinach, endive and escarole hold similar positions.

Crab meat, and scallops, shrimp and sea trout appear as good buys in sea foods. Oysters remain scarce and high in price.

Broiler-fryers promise to lead the parade of values at the meat counter in many stores this weekend. Some stores will feature fresh pork at bargain prices. Look for values in fresh picnics, shoulders, hams and spare-ribs. Beef prices are holding firm with occasional features expected on steaks. Turkey prices appear firm, a condition which promises to prevail through the Thanksgiving holiday.

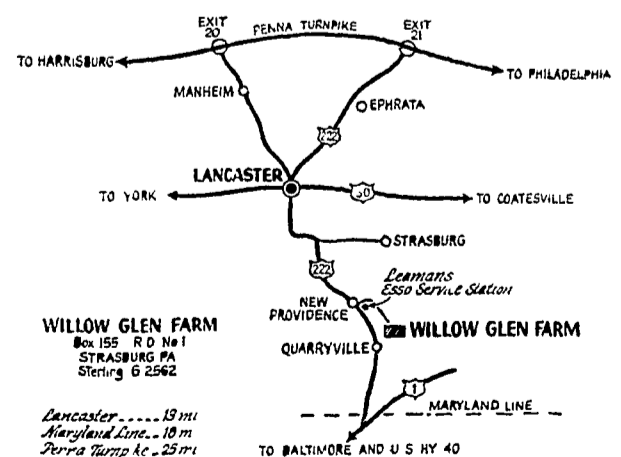
