most agricultural leaders, that urbanites do not know of the farmer's problems and do not have a true understanding of just what the much publicized farm problem is

The same situation applies with the farmer's understanding of the city resident.

"Farmers, too, are frequently

misinformed about the attitudes, needs and desires of our urban citizens," said Doctor Henning. "This is another chance for misunderstanding to develop."

"Farm-City Week, with its emphasis on getting farmers and city dwellers closer together, is an ideal remedy to stop this misunderstanding. Our daily bread is important to all of us, and we should be thoroughly familiar with all the steps and all the people who are involved in filling our need."

The state official also noted that Farm-City Week annually is timed to climax on Thanksgiving Day, a time of the year when persons throughout the nation become more cognizant of the great abundance in America.

It was noted that at this time, people usually are more receptive to learning about his neighbor's problems.

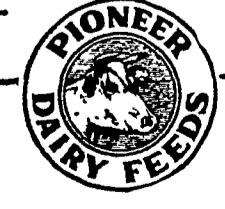
