A registered Guernsey in the herd of Raymond L. and Louise Witmer, Willow Street R1 ,was second with 14,950 pounds of milk testing 5.0 per cent for a total of 754 pounds of fat. Three other cows in the Witmer herd completed lactations with records of over 500 pounds of butterfat Mary B had 611 pounds; Sue had 553 lbs. and Duet produced 524 lbs during the first 305 days of lactation.

Only one other cow in the association produced over 700 pounds of butterfat during the 305 days ending in January A registered Hokstein in the herd of C. J. Kurtz made 704 pounds of fat in 17 440 pounds of milk with a 4.0 test

Twenty herds, in addition to the Kauffman and the Kreider and Akers herds, made an average of 50 or more pounds of butterfat per cow during the month.

Bruk Vil Patsy Rose Lucifer owned by Isaac M Brubaker, Lititz, produced 15,-320 lbs. milk and 539 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days on twice daily milking as a 7year-old.
