

Legislation Sought

Henning Asks Marketing Orders

During this session of the General Assembly, we are asking for the enactment of marketing orders for apples. Henry Henning said this is a system which has been highly successful in other states, notably California. When we have had experience with apples, we hoped the same principles can be applied to other Pennsylvania agricultural commodities" said a report from the Secretary's office this week.

This measure, to be known as the "Pennsylvania Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act of 1961," permits apple growers to set up through the Department of

Agriculture — an official program of raising money and using it for promotion, research, quality improvement, crop information or other purposes for their own benefit.

The bill provides the legal foundation upon which the actual marketing orders could be written. A marketing order would not be required appropriations of state funds; instead the growers would assess themselves, probably on a per bushel basis, and supervise how the money would be used.

These marketing orders would be considerably different in both scope and intent of the federal milk marketing orders so familiar to Pennsylvania dairy farmers. Milk marketing orders are specifically designed to affect the price of milk directly

The milk market administrator acts as a milk pricing czar, using current production and utilization information to derive a price which the farmer shall be paid for his milk.

This is not the case with the proposed agricultural marketing act. Under terms of the orders allowed by the act, no price fixing or price determination is allowed. While it is anticipated that the apple growers will want to hire a person to administer the order, this executive will act under direct control of the growers and will be responsible for reporting to them information they seek or performing for them tasks to further the goals of the market order.

Pennsylvania is not alone in consideration of such legislation. California is the most notable example of the use of state marketing orders, but orders are also in use in some 30 other states. New York, for example, has an apple marketing order in effect and New Jersey has orders on poultry and a variety of vegetables.

Enactment of this proposed legislation will give Pennsylvania apple growers another tool with which to build themselves a stronger place in their highly competitive marketing system, the report said.

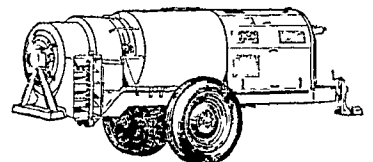

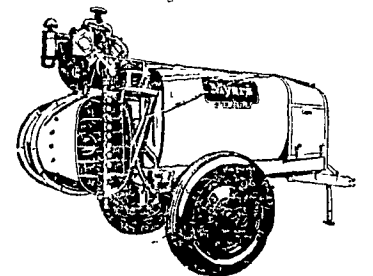
