## Farmer's Prices Four Months Decline Continues

HARRISBURG, May 2 Prices received by Penn- ed with the previous month sylvania farmers for their agricultural products declined for the fourth consecutive month, the State Department per cent of the 1910-14 base of Agriculture said today.

The mid-April average price received for all agricultural products was 4 per cent below a month earlier, the United States dropped 2 7 per cent below a year ago, per cent in April, and were and about the same as April 1959

Seasonably lower prices for milk and a decline in prices of eggs, broilers, hogs and potatoes more than off set higher prices for cows calves, sheep, lambs soybean and apples.

Livestock and livestock product prices were 6 per cent below mid-March The average wholesale blend pri cf for milk, estimated at \$4.35 per hundredweight was 40 cents below a month earlier Egg prices at 38 cents per dozen were down 3 cents from mid-March and 5 cents below last year's price

Prices received for all crops in mid-April averaged slightly below a month earlier, but 11 per cent\_below a year ago Slightly lower prices for potatoes, hay and most grains more than off set higher prices for apples and soybeans when compar-
