warm periods for bees to work

The cool, wet weather has created a pessimistic report on vegetable conditions, but it is generally conceded that a week of ideal weather can change the outlook for these crops quickly and favorably.

Planting of early potatoes has started in Potter County

and is well along in southern counties. Growers fear rotting of seed pieces in some of the earliest planted fields.

Progress of the oat crop is varied Some oats have been planted for more than a month, while adjacent fields have yet to be planted because of soil conditions. About two-thirds of the anticipated crop is in the ground.

Some wheat and barley have been drowned-out in low spots, but most fields look good to excellent.

Spittle bug and alfalfa weevil are hatching and feeding in local counties These pests are late in arriving and alfalfa fields sprayed with deildrin last fall have few weevil. Pasture growth is becoming rank, but the weather has been too wet and cold to allow cattle to broiler type.

17 million, or 21 per cent above a year ago.

Broiler type chick output in Pennsylvania during April was 51 million or slightly less than half the total hatch. Broiler chick hatchings were 22 per cent above a year earlier while the January to April hatch was one-sixth above last year

The U. S. Hatch of broiler-type chicks was nearly one-fourth greater during April 1960 than for the same month a year earlier

Throughout the United States about two-thirds of all chicks hatched are of the broiler type.

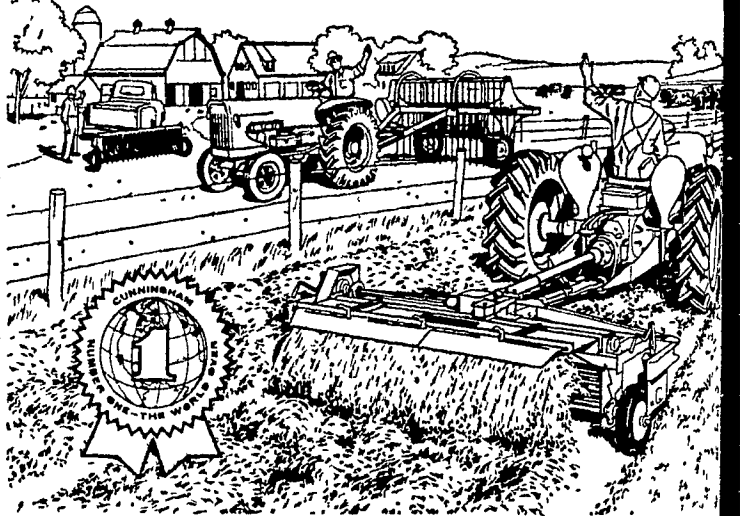

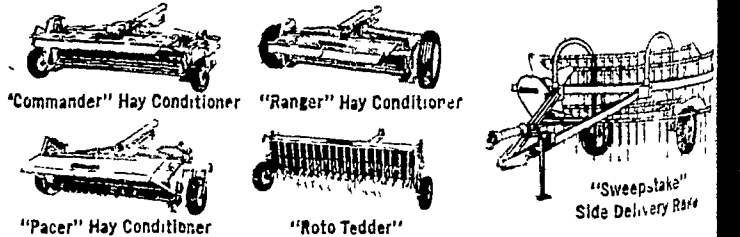
