Receipts at the June 22 sale of dairy cattle included 104 cows, eight stock bulls and seven heifers. The market was very draggy but about steady.

Fresh Holstein cows made \$300 to \$410 while Guernseys made \$175 to \$250 and other breeds sold for \$175-290. Stock bulls crossed the block at \$110-185 and stock heifers changed hands at \$80 to \$140.

At the June 19 sale of horses, ponies and mules, the market continued about steady with all mules continuing to go to the killer trade. Receipts included 251 head.

Pony mares brought \$95 to \$170 while geldings brought \$50-135. Riding horses were \$135 to \$28 and driving horses made \$135-210. Killers were 9½ to 10 cents
