

At Lancaster Yards Lightweights Advance

CATTLE: 3080 compared to 3347 head last week. Supply included 50 percent slaughter steers and 40 percent stockers and feeders. Compared with last week's close: Slaughter classes fairly active. Slaughter steers steady to 25 higher, advance largely on wghts. under 1200 lbs. Cows 125 lower. Bulls steady to weak, instances 50 lower. Stockers and feeders very slow, steady to weak. Instances 25 or more lower.

Slaughter steers: Several loads high-choice 1074-1171 lbs. 24. Load choice and prime 1103 lbs. 24.65. Bulk choice 950-1300 lbs. 22.75-24, good and low choice at 21.75-23, standard 21.25-22.

Cows: Cutter and utility 15.75-16.75, canners and low cutter 14.25-15.75, shelly canners down to 12.

Bulls: Utility and commercial 19-22, good grade 22-23.50.

Stockers and Feeders: Good and choice 800-1000 lb. feeders 22-23.50, medium and good 21-22.50, good and choice 465-8800 lb. stockers 23-27, common and medium 21-23.50.

Calves: 525 compared to 604 last week. Trading slow. Vealers steady. Good and choice vealers 27-32, choice and prime 32-34, standard and low-good 23-27, utility 21-24.

Hogs: 795 compared with 1272 last week. Barrows and gilts 50 higher. Sows scarce,

steady. **Barrows and Gilts:** U. S. 1-2 grades 190-220 lbs. 19.50-20, No. 1 190-210 lbs. 20-20.50, 1-3 190-230 lbs. 19-19.50, 2-3 grades, 230-250 lbs. 18.50-19.

Sheep: 375 compared to 577 last week. Spring slaughter lambs steady to 1.00 lower. Good and choice 65-90 lb. slaughter lambs 16-18, choice and prime 18-19, utility 15-16.

Chicago Cattle Receipts Lowest Since Last April

WEEKLY REVIEW — Cattle: Receipts lowest for any non-holiday week since April.

Slaughter steers under 1,300 pounds steady to 50 higher, mostly 25 higher. Steers 1,300 pounds and heavier and prime all wghts. weak to 50 lower. Heifers steady to 50 higher with the advance on good grade and below. Cows mostly steady, bulls 50 lower and other classes scarce.

Load of prime 1,320 lb. steers made 24.25 while the bulk of choice and prime at 900 to 1,500 pounds brought 23.50. A few loads of high choice yearlings with a pri-

Cattle receipts at the July 25 sale at Vintage included 561 head. Compared to last week's market, slaughter steers steady to 50 higher, advance on high-choice and Prime. Cows 50-1.00 lower. Bulls 50-75 lower. High-Choice and Prime slaughter steers 24.25-25.85. Choice 900-1300 lbs. 22.50-24.50, 1300-1450 lbs. 22.00-23.00, Good to low-choice 21.50-23.00, Standard 19.50-21.50.

Cutter and Utility cows 15.00-16.10, Canners and low-Cutters 14.25-15.25, shelly Canners down to 12.00. Utility and Commercial bulls at 19.00-21.75.

New Holland Heavyweights Downward

Slaughter steers weighing under 1,300 pounds were fully steady while those over 1,300 pounds were 50 lower at the July 27 auction at New Holland. Cows were unevenly steady to mostly 50 lower, bulls 50 lower. Receipts were 991 cattle.

Choice and prime slaughter steers sold at 24 to 24.75 while choice at 900 to 1,500 pounds made 22.50-24. A small supply of 1,300 to 1,550 pound steers grading at good to low choice brought 21-23.50. Standard made 19.75 to 22.

Cutter and utility cows sold for 15.75-16.75 while canners and low cutters made 14.75-15.75 and shelly canners sold down to 12. Utility and commercial bulls brought 19-22.

CALVES: 310. Vealers were steady to 1 higher. Good and choice made 28.50 to 33.50 with choice and

prime going to 33.50 to 36.50. Standard and low grade were 23.50-28.50. Utility made 21-24.50.

All classes continued to be steady at the July 26 sale of dairy cattle. Receipts included 116 cows, three bulls and 13 stock heifers.

Fresh Holstein cows made \$300 to \$440 while Guernseys changed hands at \$175 to \$245 and other breeds brought \$175-\$300. Stock heifers made \$75-140.

Mules continued to go to the killer trade at the July 24 sale of horses, ponies and mules. The market continued steady as 224 head crossed the block.

Mare ponies brought \$100 to \$175 and geldings made \$50 to \$125. Riding horses were \$130 to \$250 while driving horses brought \$150 to \$225. Killers were at 80 cents.
