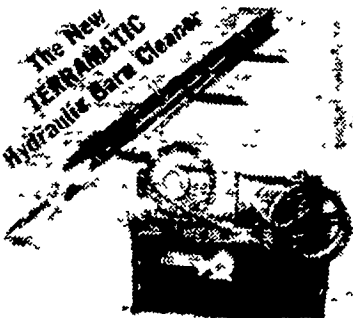

Most prime slaughter steers 25-50 higher, Choice & below 50-125 higher. Weights 1200 lbs. up including some mixed choice and prime at greatest advance. High choice and prime heifers 25-50 higher. Average choice & below 50-75 higher, Cows steady to 50 higher advance largely on utility an commercial bulls steady to strong, other classes scarce.

Two loads prime 1309 lb steers 24.25, several loads of high choice and prime 1100-1325 lb weights 24.00, Bulk choice and prime 900-1450 lbs 21.75-23.75 but 22.50 up at the close. Bulk good 900-1300 lbs 21.50-22.75, some high good 900-1050 lbs 23.00. Late Utility and standard 19-21.00.

High choice and mixed choice and prime heifers 23-23.50 bulk choice 22.25-23.00. Late good 21-22, utility and standard 16.50-20.50

Few Good and Choice 710-900 lb heifers 21.00-22.60. Cutter and Utility cows 15-17.50, Cannery and low-Cutters 15.00-15.75, shelly Cannery down to 13.00. Utility and Commercial bulls 19.50-22.50.

Calves 246. Compared last week's market, vealers were steady to 1.00 higher, instances 2.00 higher on Prime and Choice. Good and Choice vealers 29.00-34.00, Choice & Prime 34.00-37.00, few up to 38.50. Standard and low-Good 24.00-29.00, Utility 21-24.50.

The August 2 auction of dairy cattle was draggy on all kinds except top fresh Holstein Cows. Receipts included 113 cows, three stock bulls and 13 stock heifers.

Fresh Holstein cows made \$300 to \$460 while Guernseys brought \$175-240 and other breeds sold for \$175-250. Bulls brought \$110-205, and Heifers were \$75-165.

Receipts totaled 231 head at the July 31 sale of horses, ponies and mules. The market was sluggish throughout. Mules continued to go to the killer market. Pony mares brought \$90-

### CUT FUEL BILL

Fuel consumption on farm machines can be reduced an average of 15 per cent by correct adjustment and maintenance procedures, advises Burton S. Horne, Penn State extension agricultural engineer. About 75 per cent of farm machinery is out of adjustment, he claims, and unpainted, unshaded fuel storage tanks lose 3 per cent of their fuel, too.

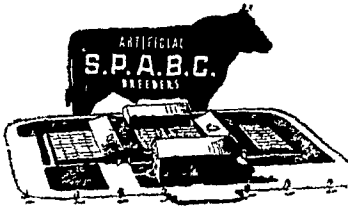
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
