

Hatchery Report Shows '61 Gains Over Last Year

Pennsylvania hatcheries produced 12 million chicks during August compared to 11 million in July and only 600,000 during the same month last year, the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service said this week in a special report.

Chick output for egg type production for the January through August period was nearly 26 million compared with 23 million for the same period a year ago.

For the United States, egg type chick production during August was one four-

th above a year earlier although seasonally lower than July.

The broiler-type chick hatch in Pennsylvania totaled 4,161,000, slightly below the total for a year earlier and six per cent below the July total.

Egg production for broiler type chicks in Pennsylvania during the January through August period was still five per cent above the comparable period in 1960.

United States output of broiler type chicks during the first seven months stand at 1,533 million, or 11 per cent above a year ago. The national broiler chick hatch during August was about 10 per cent above the total last year, the report said.

Barley Grain Signup Begins

Farmers who want to take part in the 1962 feed grain program for winter barley may sign up at the office now, Landis G. Becker, the Chairman of the Lancaster County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee announced today.

He said that notices are now being sent to barley growers throughout the County, listing the individual farm's barley feed grain base, the established yield, and the "minimum" and "additional" payment rates.

With this information, a grower may determine how participation in the program

would affect his farming operations and income.

The chairman explained that the program seeks to prevent a further buildup of unneeded feed grain stocks, by offering payments to participating farmers for diverting a portion of their farm's barley base acreage from production into conservation. A list of approved conservation uses will be available in the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office and will be announced publicly in the near future.

A farm's barley base will, in general, be the average acreage planted to barley on the farm in 1959 and 1960. To participate in the pro-

gram, a grower must divert at least 20 per cent of the base as well as comply to other provisions of the program. For this minimum diversion the payment will be 50 per cent of the farm's normal yield, at the county support price.

For an additional 20-per cent diversion — up to 40 per cent of the base, the payment will be the county support price on 60 per cent of the normal yield.

As under the 1961 feed grain program, advance payments will be made at the time growers sign up to take part in the program.

Eligibility for price support on the farm's "normal" yield of the 1962 barley acreage will depend on participation in the 1962 barley feed grain program and on meeting at least the minimum requirements of the program. These requirements include diverting at least 20 per cent of the farm barley base into conservation and not exceeding the farm's base acreage for corn and grain sorghum.

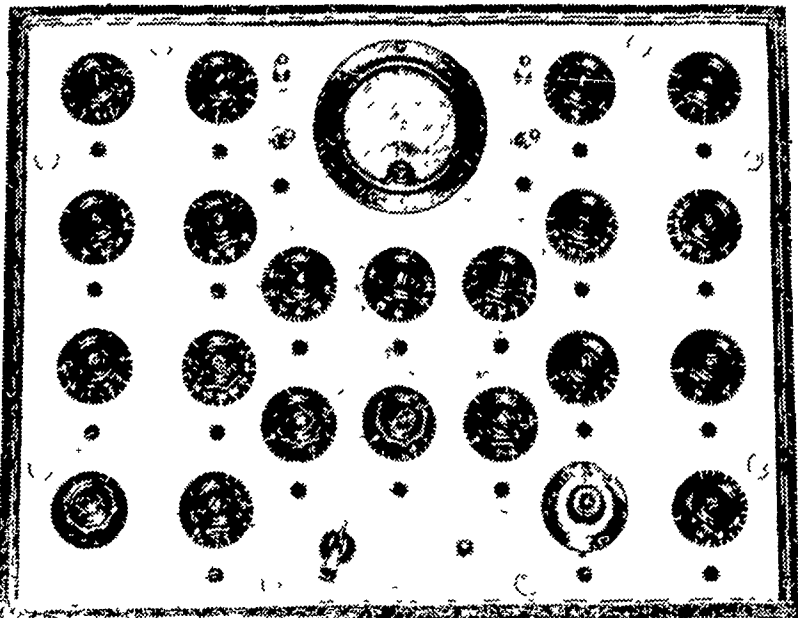
