John Nolt, a 1,010. pound 15 year old sophomore at Garden Spot High School. Last year his steer finished last in the show. The reserve champion weighing 990 pounds was bought by People's Restaurant in New Holland for 35 cents per pound.

The only FFA steer in the sale was bid in for Joseph Venezia of Norristown at 30 5 cents per pound. The FFA champion, also an Angus was entered by Richard R. Martin, East Earl R1. He tipped the scales at 1,200 pounds.

Champion Hereford in the show was exhibited by Harold Leaman, 2554 Creek Hill Road, Lancaster. Anna Pearl Lapp, Bareville R1, had the runner up Hereford of the show.

A Manheim R3 youth took his first grand championship in eight years of competition at the Manheim Farm Show Wednesday night. Not content with one rosette, he went on to make a clean sweep of the show by garnering the fitting and showing crowns as well.

Wilbur Hosler, the 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Hosler, had never carried off the grand champion-

ship of a beef show although fame had brushed close by on several occasions.

In his first showing as an 11 year old club member, he exhibited the top Hereford in the Manheim show only to see two Angus place above him in the grand championship

## 4-H Dairy Team Places Fourth In National Show

Pennsylvania's 4-H Dairy Judging Team returned to the county Thursday afternoon with a plaque for fourth place in the national judging contest at the National Dairy Cattle Show in Waterloo, Iowa.

Only 10 points out of nearly 2,000 points separated the second and fourth place teams. Maryland's 4-H team took the championship with a total team score of 2,087; Oklahoma followed with 1,993 points, Florida scored 1,988 points and the Garden Spot contingent racked up 1,983 points in placing the ten classes of dairy cattle.

Competing against 33 other state teams, the local boys placed second in Jersey judging, fifth in Holsteins and 10th in Ayrshire-Brown Swiss.
