race. Again in 1958, Hosler fed another Hereford and showed him to the reserve championship of the now defunct Lititz Show.

Fate again took the championship away from the Hosler farm when a steer bred on the farm was drawn for club work by a cousin, Glen Foreman. Foreman took the steer all the way to the state championship at the Pennsylvania Farm Show in '60.

Last fall Wilbur put a half brother of the state champion on feed and saw him waddle to the winner's circle Wednesday night.

Judge Jack Phillips, from the Animal Husbandry Department of the Pennsylvania State University, placed the 1050 pound black, named "Paunchy" for his tendency to fill out in the middle, over the Hereford of Jay Bixler, Marietta R1.

Bixler, the 16-year old son of Mr and Mrs Lewis E Bixler, exhibited his 1000 pound steer "Shorty" to the championship of his breed and reserve honors of the show. Shorty was bred at Poca Dot Farms at Charlestown, West Virginia.

Bixler garnered his reserve rosette in his first year of showing. He is a junior in vocational agriculture at Donegal High School.

Two other Hoslers got into the limelight at the show when Michael had the fattest steer of the show and Robert showed the champion Shorthorn. Both are younger brothers of Wilbur.
