

Dairy Club Presidents Are All Project Winners

Two Lancaster County 4-H dairy club members repeated as champions in project competition when the book scores were totaled at the annual banquet of the combined clubs last Friday night.

Paul Trimble, president of the county Holstein club and Mary Ellen Mumma, president of the Guernsey club turned in high project book scores for the second consecutive year.

Trimble, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Trimble, Quarryville R1, finished the project year with a total score of 976 to win the Holstein breed competition. Miss Mumma, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Mumma, of Manheim R1, scored 972 points out of a possible 100 in the Guernsey club.

R. Edwin Harnish, Christiana R1, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph E. Harnish, turned in the highest score of any club members when his Ayrshire project record totaled 985. He is the president of the county Ayrshire-Jersey club.

High score in the Jersey breed was won by Miss Phyllis Landis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Landis, of 172 Oak View Road, Lancaster.

Awards for breed type championship, fitting and showmanship at the county dairy club roundups in August, were made before the 200 members and parents at the Strasburg fire hall.

Entertainment was furnished by a reed choir from Solanco High School with Mr. Ralph Downey conducting. Darvin Boyd, Ephrata R1, now a student at Delaware Valley College of Agriculture, was the featured speaker. He explained the four points of the 4-H club

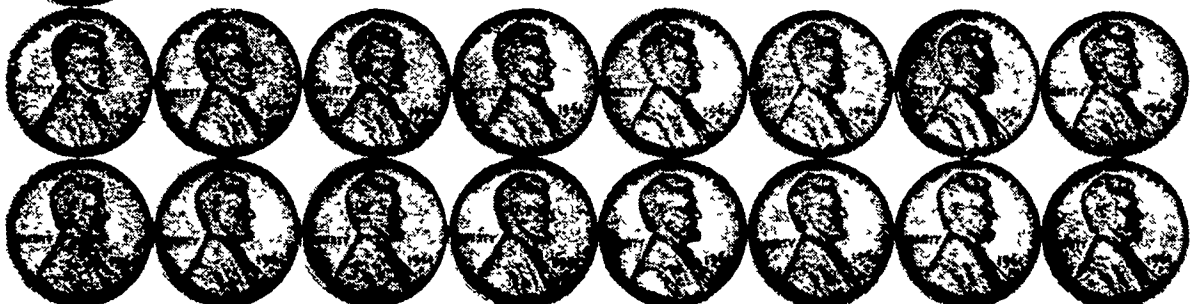
