**Processed Potato
Market Expands**

Use of dehydrated mashed
potatoes and frozen French
fried potatoes has increased
rapidly since 1958, but a
potentially large market for
these products remains un-
tapped, according to a report
issued today by the U. S.
Department of Agriculture.

A survey of restaurants
in the Philadelphia metro-
politan area revealed that
the number of restaurants
using frozen French fries had
doubled from 1958 to 1960
and the number using de-
hydrated mashed potatoes
tripled. By April 1960, 39
per cent of the restaurants
were using frozen French
fries and nearly a third
were using dehydrated mash
ed potatoes.

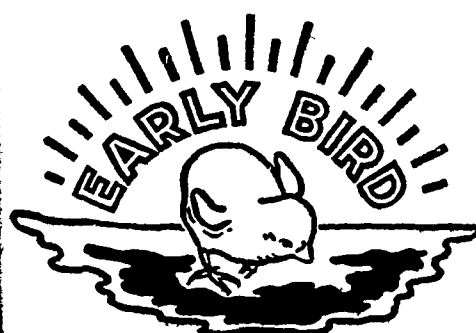
