Harrisburg—Visitors to the 1962 Pennsylvania Farm Show, will have an opportunity to see an actual country kitchen of the 18th Century, thanks to the efforts of some Lancaster Countians.

The Pennsylvania Farm Museum will reproduce the Colonial setting at its booth on the first concourse of the Large Arena building.

## County Future Farmers Win Fourteen Degrees

Fourteen Lancaster County Future Farmers of America will be awarded Keystone Farmer Degrees at ceremonies next Wednesday.

The Keystone Farmer Degree, the highest award that can be given by the state association of FFA is conferred on only two per cent of the total state membership.

In addition to outstanding work in the vocational agriculture classroom, recipients of the degree must have above average participation in school and community activities and FFA work. They must have demonstrated some inclination toward becoming established in the business of agriculture and have earned at least \$500 in supervised farming programs.

The awards will be presented by the State Officers of FFA during the winter convention at 130 January 10 in the Forum of the Educa-
