## County Farm Boy In Army Training

Fort Knox, Ky. — Private Glenn A. Shirk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman A. Shirk, Quarryville, Pa., is presently assigned to Company E of the Specialist Training Regiment, a major unit of the U.S. Army Training Center, Armor (USATCA), Fort Knox, Ky., where he is undergoing advanced individual training at the Army General Supply School.

During the eight-week course, Pvt. Shirk will receive instruction and training in supply administrative procedures and how to operate certain office machines including typewriters, adding machines, calculating and duplicating machines. Some of the more important subjects taught are preservation and packaging methods, storage procedures, and publications.

During the sixth week of a graded 12-hour practical exercise is given in which Pvt. Shirk will be required to complete all the paper work in a given supply situation. Upon completion of the course, he will be qualified and rated as a general supply clerk.

Pvt. Shirk is a 1955 graduate of Solanco High School and received his M.S. Degree from Penn State University in

1961. He was employed as an assistant county agent by the Somerset County Extension Association prior to entering the military service. He com-
