

### Best Food Buys Season For Freezing Steaks

Although we've had but a few really nice days it's possible that many folks have already cast longing eyes on the backyard patio, making plans for the season of summer cook-outs. And although it may be too soon for such outdoor activity, it's just the right time to freeze a supply of steaks for those barbeque treats, observes Tom Piper, Penn State Extension Marketing Agent.

Demand lags for beef steaks at this season of the year and prices are favorable for those who wish to freeze a supply for later use. Check the manner in which featured steaks have been trimmed to avoid undue wastage. Forequarter beef and all fresh pork cuts are currently in plentiful supply. Hams prove an exception in that Easter demand is already exerting an upward pressure on prices. Turkeys and frying chicken remain on the list of meat values.

Several weeks of good growing weather will be required before significant improvements are seen in the fresh produce supply situation. Cabbage prices are high and promise to remain so until late April. Celery, lettuce, green beans, radishes and cucumbers share in this dilemma.

Potato prices remain low and most favorable to the economy-minded shopper. New crop red varieties are now available. Tomatoes, green onions, hothouse rhubarb, endive, escarole and leafy green salad items are reasonably priced. Larger shipments of asparagus from California will soon bring lower prices on this popular vegetable.

Apples grapefruit and

oranges lead the parade of fresh fruit values. Banana prices remain on the high side due to supply shortages. Good storage conditions makes it possible to obtain grapes of very fine quality. Melons arriving from Mexico; Florida will begin shipping in about two weeks. Although slightly higher in price this week, strawberries should be quite plentiful this spring and prices to please all budgets.

Milk and egg production are headed for seasonal peaks. Farm and wholesale egg prices range from four to eight cents below a year ago, and retail prices show a similar drop. Milk production is running 2½ percent above the record year of 1961 with all dairy products in plentiful supply. Ephrata R2 bought a spotted
