● **Holstein Cow**

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Five other cows in the association had 700, or better, pounds of butterfat during the lactations just finished. The owners and the cow's records are as follows: John J. Herr had a Holstein cow with 750 pounds of butterfat and 17,983 pounds of milk. Edwin J. Landis had a Holstein cow with 748 pounds of butterfat and 16,766 pounds of milk.

Mary B. Stoltzfus had a Holstein cow with 735 pounds of butterfat and 16,301 pounds of milk. Titus M. Hurst had a Holstein cow with 718 pounds of butterfat and 23,411 pounds of milk. John S. Shelby had a Holstein cow with 700 pounds of butterfat and 18,826 pounds of milk.

The herd of Richard I. Keller, Manheim R1, had the highest monthly butterfat average for the month.

His 21 registered and graded Holstein cows averaged 58 pounds of butterfat in 1,599 pounds of milk with a 3.9 per cent test.

The 34 registered and graded Hostems in the herd of Curtis Akers and Clayton Kreider, Quarryville R1, averaged 57 pounds of butterfat in 1,170 pounds of milk with a 3.9 per cent test.

The herds of Hiram S. Aungst and John L. Beiler had averages of 55 pounds of butterfat. A total of 20 other herds in the association had 50 or more pounds average.

The roundup was held in conjunction with an educational meeting sponsored by the Lancaster Poultry Association. The featured speaker was Dr. Robert F. Gentry, head of the Poultry Disease Research and Diagnostic Laboratory at the Pennsylvania State University. His subject was the cause and control of fowl leucosis and related poultry diseases.

There is no cure for the disease that causes millions of dollars of loss to poultry farmers each year, he said, but strict sanitation measures and isolation of infected flocks will control the spread of the disease.

**Hempfield 4-H Holds Election**


Miss Marie Bushong, Columbia R2, was elected president of the Hempfield 4-H Community Club at a recent meeting.
