## Revised Farm Milk Price Estimate Issued

New York — Revised estimates of farm milk prices in the New York-New Jersey milkshed for the quarter beginning April 1 were issued here today following the announcement in Washington of lower government dairy support prices.

Dr. C. J. Blanford, milk market administrator, said his new estimates of uniform farm prices are \$3.68 per hundredweight (46.5 quarts) for April, \$3.47 for May, and \$3.49 for June.

The administrator's new April estimate is 16 cents lower than his first prediction, made (Continued on Page 24)
