Allied Mills Hogs Raise Chicago Top To \$17.75 Thursday

Only Scant Showing Over \$16.75; Most Young Stock Worth \$16.50 and Below; Other Markets Are Erratic

Although hog receipts in Chicago were largest for Thursday in seven weeks, the majority of offerings cleared quickly at steady prices in a brisk trade.

The \$17.75 top was paid for 43 Allied Mills hogs averaging 211. The next highest sale was \$17.50, paid for 22 purebred Hampshires.

The top of the Chicago hog market advanced 75c Thursday, but the \$17.75 price was paid for the Allied Mills hogs from Lake county, Ill., and not comparable to the \$17 hogs that topped Wednesday's trade.

Only a small share of offerings consisted of stock worth more than \$16.75.

Other selling points over the nation were erratic, ranging from 50c lower to 50c higher.

About 71 per cent of the markets heard from had price declines.

Fresh pork held steady in Chicago, but ranged to \$1 lower in New York.

Because several lots of "reputation" hogs came to market, a scattering of sales were made that appeared "high" on paper.

Prices for the day averaged steady at \$15.95, which compared with \$15.90 a week ago and with \$17 a year ago.

The \$17.75 top of the market was paid for 43 hogs averaging 211 from the Allied Mills farms, in Lake county, Ill., selected by Paul Moesle of the Thompson Farm brand of Chicago.

Allied Mills Farm Lake county Ill., topped the market Thursday at \$17.50 with 40 hogs that averaged 210, the only stock to reach the price Wayne was used in the ration.

Thurs., Nov. 30, 1961 Page 3

Allied Mills farm in Lake county, Ill., topped the Wednesday market with 66 meaty young hogs, at \$17.50. These were the only hogs to reach the top, which equaled the highest sale since Oct. 13. Wayne was used in the ration.

Thurs., August 17, 1961

The \$19.25 top for the Allied Mills hogs was 25c higher and equaled the highest sale since December, 1958. This compares with \$19 last Wednesday and with \$17.50 a year ago.

Jack Callahan in charge of buying for the Thompson Farm brand of Chicago bid

in the Allied Mills hogs at the \$19.25 top.

There were 50 of these "reputation" hogs that averaged 204 at the top.

Mr. Callahan and his buying staff bid in 200 other selected hogs within a range of \$18 to \$18.75 that weighed 180 to 210.

Allied Mills Lake county, Ill., topped the market at \$17.75 Wednesday with 69 butchers that averaged 228, Wayne was used in the ration.

Thurs., April 13, 1961 Page 3

Allied Mills Lake county, Ill., owned the 106 meaty butchers "reputation" hogs, that averaged 244 at \$18.35, the extreme top Tuesday. These hogs were 35c above the top price for regular market hogs and appeared to average in the 230s. They brought \$110 over bids for some of the fattest stock of similar weight. Wayne was used in the ration.
