Pasture Cows Gradually


Don't be in too much of a hurry to get your cows out on lush pastures is the advice of Joe Taylor, Penn State extension dairy specialist. He warns

that a sudden change from winter feeding to pasture feeding can cause mastitis, and suggests feeding some hay and grain before dairy cows go out to pasture each day early in the season.

Protect Fruits

To control diseases on fruit, apply sprays at intervals to give adequate protection. Allen Bauer, Penn State extension plant pathologist, announces that spray schedules for all types of fruit crops can be obtained from the county agent.
