#### FIVE - DAY WEATHER FORECAST

#### Saturday - Wednesday

Temperatures during the next five days are expected to average 5 to 10 degrees above the normal range of 49 at night to 70 in the afternoon. Cooler temperatures are expected towards the middle of the period turning warmer again towards the end of the period. Precipitation may total 0.1 inch or less occurring as showers about the middle of the period.
