

Holstein Cow In Sauder Herd Has Highest DHIA Record

A registered Holstein cow owned by Ernest J. Sauder, Lancaster R1, completed the highest 305 day lactation during the month of March according to a report issued this week by the Red Rose Dairy Improvement.

The Sauder Holstein Lou August Marietta R1 had the highest butterfat average during the month. Her herd of 18 registered Holsteins made an average of 65 pounds of butterfat in 1649 pounds of milk with a 3.9 per cent test.

Second high average was made by the 19 registered Holsteins in the herd of Allen Lee Stoltzius Honeybrook R1. The average was 62 pounds of butterfat produced in 1610 pounds of milk with a 3.9 per cent test.

Nine other cows in the association finished lactations with over 650 pounds of butterfat. They were in the herds of Fred John C. Groff, Mary B. Stoltzius, Ezra M. Martin, Raymond R. Landis, John S. Shelly, John M. King, Elym Hess, Jr. and John H. Stauffer.

Only one other herd averaged over 60 pounds of fat during the month. Robert H. Kaufman Manheim R1 milked an average of 1465 pounds of milk and 60 pounds of butterfat from his 22 Holsteins.

The herds of Arthur Wenger, John C. Groff, Amos M. Lapp and Jacob N. Good had averages of 59 pounds of butterfat.

A total of 75 herds in the association averaged 50 or more pounds of butterfat during the month.
