

Secretary Freeman said he also is sending a special study mission to the Common Market It will be headed by Dr. Willard Cochrane, Director of the USDA's Agricultural Economics.

The Secretary emphasized that the US has a big stake in the aevelopment of the Common Market because it affects this nation's cash markets in Western Europe, the balance of payments, the US and programs and America's entire international position

He said the immediate question centers on what will happen to US farm exports to the area atter the Common Market's agricultural policy goes into effect July 1.

"We have had assurances from the Common Market leaders that our agricultural exports to the area will not be hurt Nevertheless, when we look at the Common Agricultural Policy we clearly see built into it the highly unusual variable levy system which could very easily taper down or close off the exports of certain of our farm products, including wheat, feed grains, rice, poultry, certain fruit and vegetable products, and some others," the Secretary said



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
