

Large Pennsylvania Dairy Farms Are Becoming "Milk Factories"

Large dairy farms in Pennsylvania may some day be more like milk factories. A survey by management researchers to the Pennsylvania State University indicates.

The survey showed that many farmers with 80 or more cows are looking for ways to eliminate such chores as growing or crops and raising or herd replacements. Over 100 dairy farms have herds of 80 or more cows.

Operators could buy constant supplies of high quality rations and desirable herd replacement animals they would never take advantage of their space, James S. Holt and William F. Parrinsco, professor of farm management, said in the survey. They viewed include 196 operators of the 10 largest privately owned herds in the state. In making the operation more routine many operators are eliminating pasture and even green chop in favor of year-round feeding from storage.

As yet most of the large dairy farms in Pennsylvania are still small farms growing an hour's pay will buy one loaf more bread, nearly two pounds more chuck roast, 11 pounds more potatoes, two quarts more milk or one and one-half dozen more eggs.

About one-third of the herds were loose-housed. Most operators were satisfied with the program and said the intended to stay in loose housing. Some operators using conventional stanchion barns planned to expand into loose housing.

Operators of the large farms are actively seeking new techniques to use in management, the Penn State economists report. Some operators are experimenting with production payment plans and profit-sharing bonuses or hired men.

A winter course scholarship of \$100 has been established in the Pennsylvania State University by the Pennsylvania Nurserymen's Association. Awarded annually, the scholarship will aid a third or fourth term student in the two-year winter course program on ornamental nursery management. The winner will be selected on the basis of scholarship, need, potential achievement and character.




