"Ready?!"

Grease Fire - Water only makes a grease fire worse, says Helen Bell, Penn State extension home management specialist. Drop a tight fitting lid or cover on the pan to smother a grease fire, or sprinkle baking soda or salt over the fat. Flour will explode. Grease fires result when the heavy fumes of the fat role down the outside of the pan and ignite when they come in contact with the burner flame.

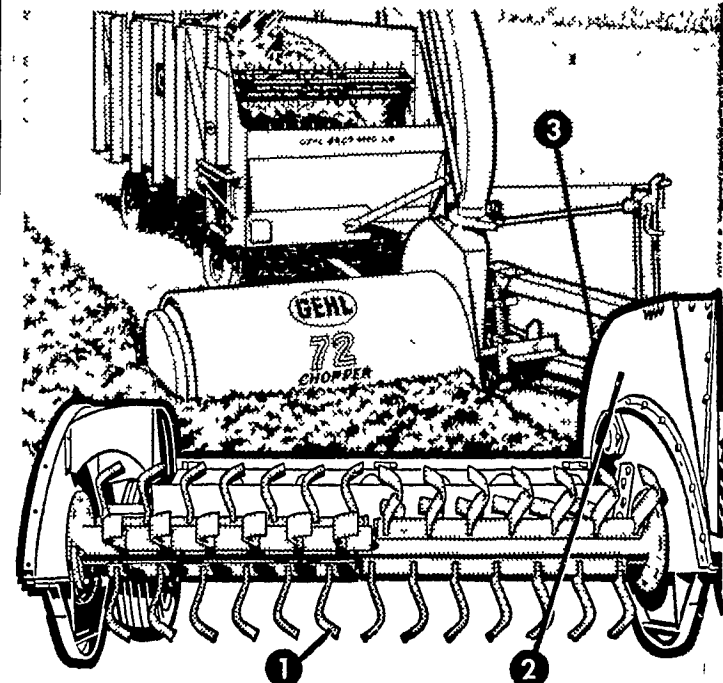
