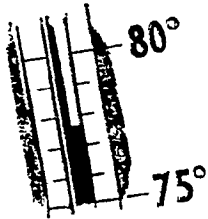
GOOD MANAGEMENT PAYS IN HOT WEATHER

1. DEBEAKING

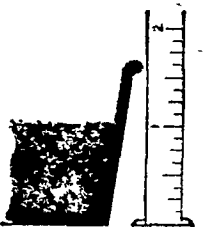
RIGHT WAY



Top beak removed and cauterized



Keep water between 75° - 80°

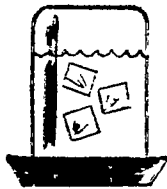


Keep feed in feeder lids or hoppers at least 1" deep

WRONG WAY



Beak cut too short



Birds avoid cold water



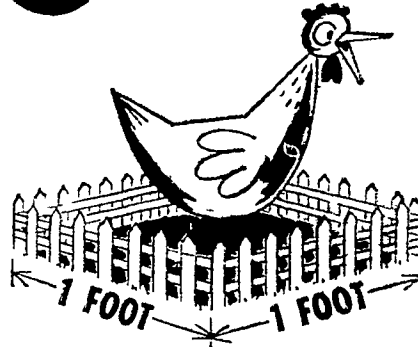
Skimpy shallow feed hurts beak, slows growth

4. UNIFORM LIGHTING



Avoid sun spots, bright areas, flashing lights. Keep daylight or artificial lighting even at all times.

5. GIVE BIRDS ROOM



They need at least one square foot each for proper room to move around and grow properly.

2. VENTILATION

Keep birds comfortable. Give them plenty of air but avoid severe drafts.

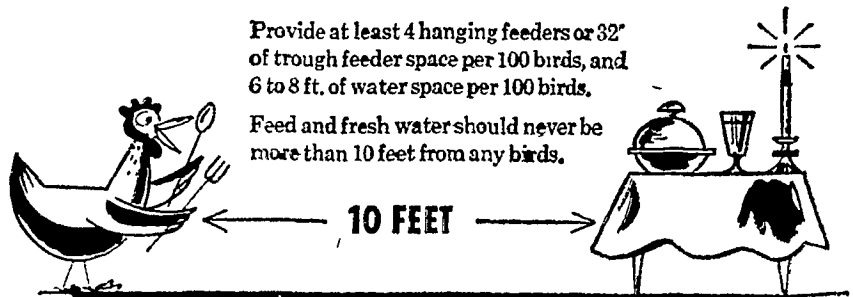

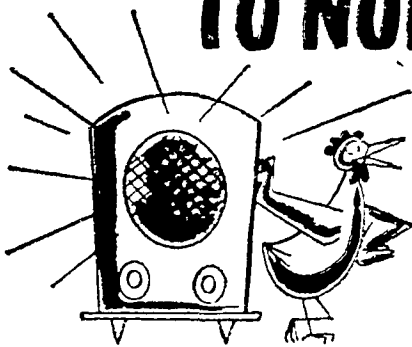
6. SPACE TO EAT AND DRINK

Provide at least 4 hanging feeders or 32" of trough feeder space per 100 birds, and 6 to 8 ft. of water space per 100 birds.

Feed and fresh water should never be more than 10 feet from any birds.
