

County 4-H Clubs Select Two Members As Posture Queens

County 4-H'ers chose two Posture Queens from among their membership Thursday night at the climax of the annual Field Day activity.

Chosen as Senior Queen, from among 22 contestants between the ages of 15 and 21 years, was Miss Lois Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Johnson, Sr., Quarryville R2.

Topping a field of 29 contestants between the ages of 10 and 14 years was Miss Kaye Ream, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Ream, Talmage.

Fifty-one girls representing local clubs from all parts of the county were in contention for the crown, symbolic of the "Health" portion of the 4-H emblem. The other three H's stand for Head, Heart, and Hands.

Two queens were chosen, signifying to 4-H members that good health are important at any age.

Miss Johnson, a 15-year old Junior student at Solanco High School, is in her seventh year of 4-H club work. She has had projects of flowers, garden and sewing in the Kirkwood Community Club, her sponsor in the contest. Lois was a winner in the Rural Youth contest at Solanco Fair, but had never before won a 4-H event. She was crowned Thursday night by Miss Pat Zartman, Ephrata R1, retiring Senior Posture Queen.

The tall, 13 year old, Junior Queen will be a freshman at Conestoga Valley Junior High in the fall. She represented the Farmersville Jolly Stit-

ch sewing club, and won the award in her first year in 4-H club work. Her crown was set in place by Miss Barbara Rock, Akron, last year's Junior Queen.

Nearly 600 parents and friends witnessed the pageant in the newly-constructed amphitheatre at the park, and many of them joined in the candlelight ceremony following the contest.

Judging the senior contest were Dr. E. Z. Martin, president of the Lancaster County Chiropractic Association; Miss Ann Holoka, special features editor of the Lancaster Newspapers, and Miss Ann Herr, of WGAL television. The junior division was judged by George G. McGinness, Assistant professor of Physical Education at Franklin and Marshall College, and Miss Joan Kline, WGAL television Master of ceremonies was Robert Malick, also of the television station.

The contest was sponsored by the Lancaster County 4-H council.

The Lincoln Community club has been invited to meet with the Drumore club at the Holtwood Picnic grounds on August 21.

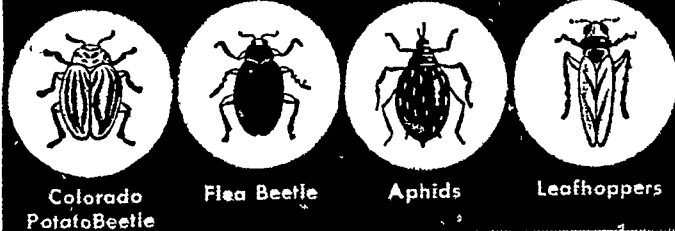
