

4-H Horse Show Farm Calendar Is Scheduled

County 4-H light horse and pony club members will vie for ribbons and a chance to move on to further competition next week when the local clubs hold the annual roundup at Bateville.

Classes will begin at 12:30 p.m. August 4 on the show grounds to the rear of the John Glick Trailer shop on Route 23.

Fitting and showing, the first class, will begin promptly and every member is required to enter this class in order to complete the project according to Winthrop Merriam assistant county agent.

The four winners in each class will be eligible to compete in the District show September 22 at Ludwig Corners, Chester County, Merriam said. The only exception is the grooming and showmanship contest in which two junior and two senior winners will go on to district competition.

Of the 14 classes open to club members five will have junior and senior divisions with 14 years as the dividing line. All members under 14 as of January 1, 1962 must compete in the junior division.

In two of the classes, there will be a division for ponies under 14 hands and for horses over 14 hands.

Members may enter as many classes as they desire, Merriam said but cautioned clubbers to enter only the classes in which their mounts would work. Riders must compete

with either English or Western Style tack and may not change back and forth during the show.

Classes in addition to grooming and showing will include Weanlings and yearlings, pleasure driving pony, western equitation, saddle seat equitation, hunter seat equitation, jumping equitation, bareback equitation, English pleasure, western pleasure, western reining, open trail class (open to English and western ponies and horses) pole bending, and clover leaf barrel race.

Mrs. Wilda Fulmer, noted horse breeder and 4-H leader from Chester County will judge the competition.

area was being made with that consideration.

Smith said Thursday at a meeting of Holstein dairymen the benefits of being designated a disaster area would be small unless some federal aid in reduced feed grain costs or reduced shipping rates for hay is included. At present the only benefits listed are making hay and grazing diverted acres and "there is nothing there to harvest."

Meanwhile secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman Thursday added another nine Pennsylvania counties to the 40 previously designated as disaster areas. One of the nine counties is Lancaster's northern neighbor Lebanon. Cool nights and overcast days during the week stretched the benefits of the light rains of Monday night over corn and tobacco crops a somewhat brighter appearance during the week but crops in the north and western sections of the county continued to feel the pinch of dry soil.
