

Dress Review Is Next Week

Over 50 contestants have submitted entries in the county 4-H Dress Review on August 2, Extension Home Economist, Norma J. DeLellis said this week.

Competition among sewing clubs will be held in two phases this year. In the first phase, girls will exhibit clothing they have constructed during the year at 9:30 to 11:00 a. m. in the Manheim Central

High School. During the afternoon, competition will move to the auditorium of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau Cooperative Association on the Dillerville Pike.

Mrs. DeLellis pointed out that much more than the construction of the garment will be considered in the judging. An entry form completed by the contestant will count 25 points. Another 25 points are awarded for the posture, poise, grooming and attitude of the girl. Color, choice of fabric, fit, accessories, value for the money, and the outfit on the girl will account for 50 points. The remaining 25 points will be awarded for construction

to the auditorium of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau of the garment itself, which will include accurate cutting, and the look of quality.

Girls placing in the top six will represent the county at the District Dress Review on August 23 in Philadelphia.

Mrs. DeLellis also announced that county 4-H clothing club roundups will be held at Penn Manor High School on August 9 at 11:45 a. m.

Keep Bugs Away

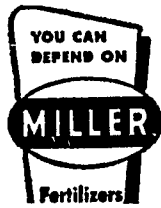

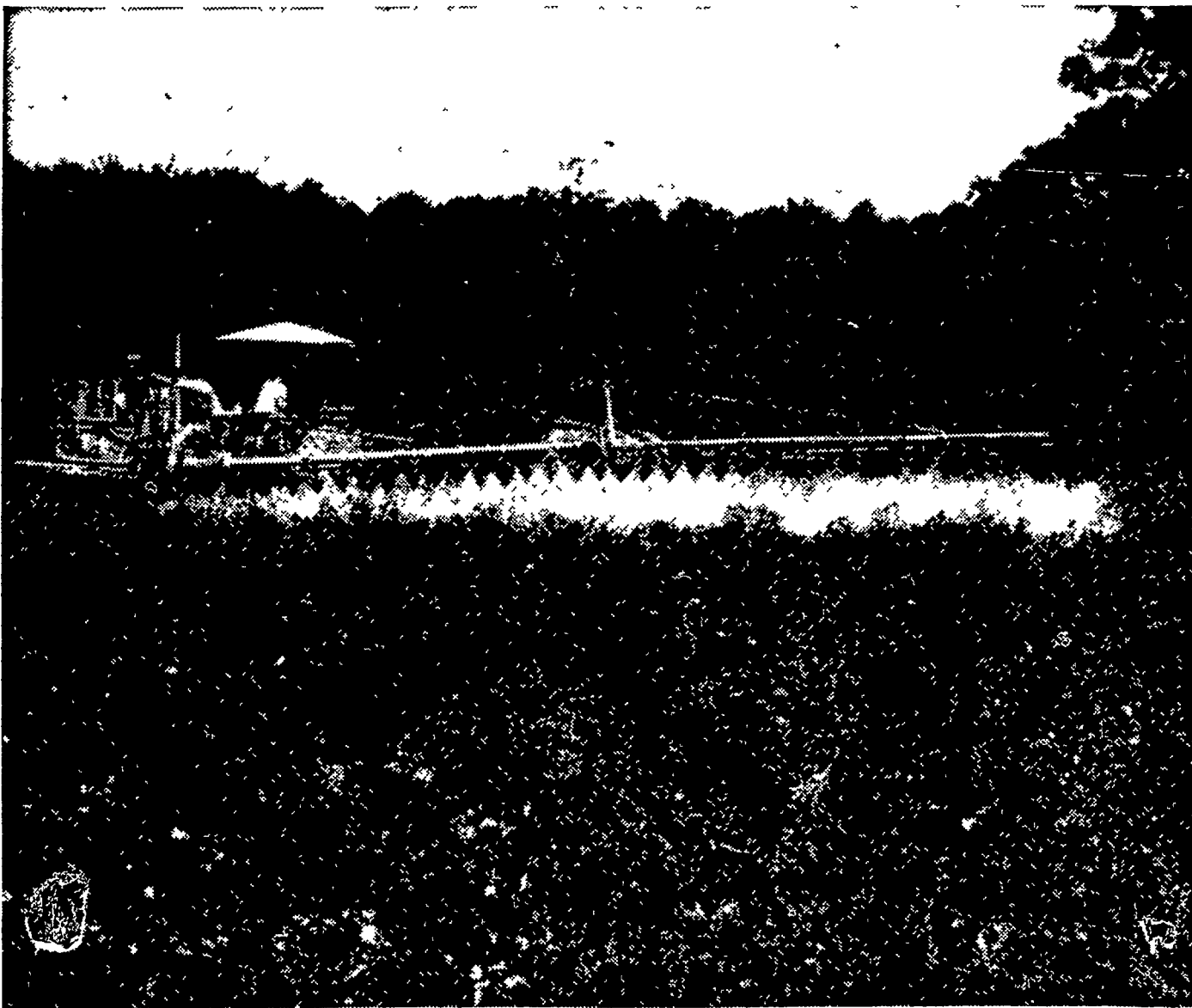
