

State Leads In Production Of Ice Cream

HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania led the nation in 1961 in manufactured frozen dairy products. Combined output of ice cream, ice milk and milk sherbet totaled 847 million gallons, the State Department of Agriculture announced today.

Ice cream production totaled 733 million gallons, 2 per cent less than the record high of 751 million gallons in 1960. Pennsylvania had been the leading ice cream producing state since 1940, but last

year's decline moved New York into first place with 757 million gallons, and the Commonwealth now ranks second from seventh to the fifth ranking state. A record number of 1,027 plants manufactured the product, 219 more than a year ago.

Ice cream and other frozen products utilized 1,187 million pounds of whole milk during 1961, or 58 per cent of all whole milk used in all manufactured dairy products from Pennsylvania. This was an increase of 134 million pounds over the 1960 usage.

The state's production of mixes for ice cream, ice milk and milk sherbet took a 3 per cent jump over 1960. Ice cream mix represented 87 per cent of all mixes produced and totaled 395 million gallons.

Plants producing under 20,000 gallons manufactured 880,000 fewer gallons in 1961 than in the previous year. Ice milk production increased 33 per cent above 1960 and advanced Pennsylvania

The number of plants producing frozen dairy products increased 3 per cent over 1960. Counter freezer type operations were solely responsible for the increase. They represented 91 per cent of all plants, but only 17 per cent of all frozen products.
