Potato Spraying Controlled

Maleic hydrazide sprayed on green potato vines in the field will control sprouting of the tubers in storage, says Elmer Pifer, extension agronomist.

This chemical will prevent sprouting of potatoes for 6 months longer than untreated potatoes even at storage temperatures of 55 to 65 degrees Fahrenheight

Maleic hydrazide is of value for table stock potatoes which must be stored for several months It has a distinct advantage for potatoes for the potato chip processor by allowing potatoes to be stored at relatively high temperatures which prevent the accumulation of sugars in the tubers.

It must NOT be used on potatoes which will be used tor seed as it will hinder their desired sprouting, Pifer cau-

Be sure to follow the manutacturer's label directions in the use of maleic hydrazide as a sprout inhibitor, he said.
