State Gamelands To Be Opened For Inspection

Lancaster Area hunters and sportsman will have another opportunity this year to tour the Goldmine game preserve, District Game Protector, John Eicholtz said this week.

Eicholtz said many of the hunters from this county go to the Goldmine area in Northern Lebanon County during hunting season and will welcome this chance to tour the gamelands and inspect the work of the state game commission.

The automobile tour of about 25 miles through Lebanon and Dauphin counties will be held on October 7, Eicholtz said.

The tour is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. at the state gamelands gate on gamelands road 211, and is expected to take approximately four hours. Stops will be made so that visitors can inspect game food plots, turkey feeders, and improvement of natural feed and cover. Eicholtz said the work done at the Goldmine tract is typical of the work being done on all state gamelands of which there are approximately a million acres.

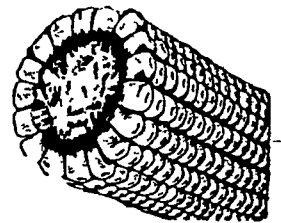

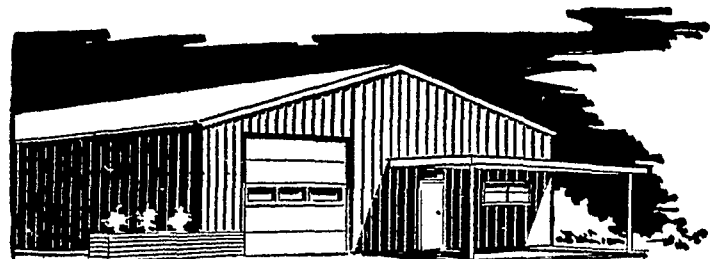
