

Certified Seed Regulations To Be Reviewed

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Pennsylvania Agriculture Secretary William L. Henning today said a review of seed certification and purity standards by the International Crop Improvement Association at its 44th annual meeting, Nov. 5-8 at Hershey, will be "in step with rapid changes that are taking place in all segments of agriculture."

C. F. Campbell, Harrisburg, Chairman of Arrangements, said attention will focus also on needs in research and on a variety of factors relating

to seed production and distribution. Farm changes, he added, are affecting all phases of the seed industry. Commodity committees for the various seed species will study these standards with a view to revising and strengthening them as may be needed.

Seed certification in a period of accelerated agricultural adjustment will be the theme of a meeting Wednesday morning, Nov. 7, for seed growers and distributors, with Dr. Henry R. Fortmann, assistant director, Agricultural Experiment Station, the Pennsylvania State University, University Park, presiding. Speakers will include New Jersey Agricultural Secretary Phillip Alampi, Trenton, N. J.

Chairman Campbell, in charge of seed certification, Bureau of Plant Industry, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, said more than 300 delegates from seed certification agencies in 45 states and Canada will attend. Wives will have a special tours program. Registrations start Sunday, Nov. 4. The convention will open with a Pennsylvania breakfast Monday, Nov. 5, and close with a banquet Thursday night, Nov. 8. All convention activities will be in Hotel Hershey.

Mushrooms Are Subject Of Convention

Pennsylvania's \$38,000,000 mushroom growing industry will be host to the fifth International Mushroom Congress to be held in Philadelphia Oct. 28 to Nov. 2.

The event will be the opportunity of a lifetime for mushroom growers to hear talks by authorities from nine nations, says Leon R. Kneebone, in charge of mushroom research at the Pennsylvania State University and chairman of a national committee organ-

izing the Congress. He says over 600 commercial mushroom growers are located in 15 Pennsylvania counties.

Reports will be given by mushroom experts from the United States, Canada, England, Switzerland, Denmark, West Germany, Hungary, France, and the Netherlands. Five speakers from Penn State will be featured.

As congress headquarters, Philadelphia is near Chester County, the world's largest mushroom growing area. Buses will tour the county on Oct. 31.

This occasion marks the first time the Mushroom Congress has been held in the United States. Dr. Kneebone believes it will not be held again in this county for at least 15 years.

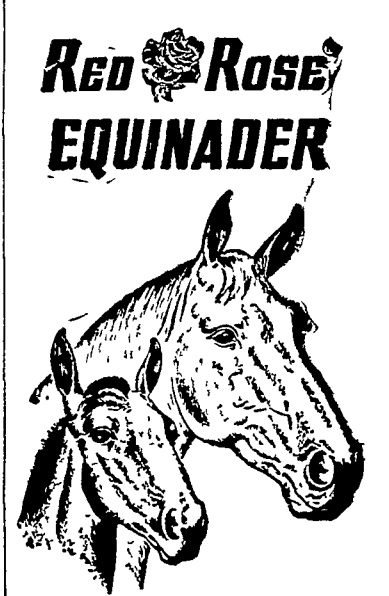
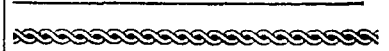
