Six members of the Grassland FFA Chapter of the Garden Spot High School attended the 35th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America held in Kansas City, Mo. on October 10th, 11th, and 12th.

They attended the convention as representatives of their FFA Chapter and the New Holland Machine Company which used its company plane to transport the group to the convention. Attending were Larry Weaver, Wilmer Martin, Richard Martin, Carl Gehman, Samuel Fritz, and Donald Zimmerman, all Seniors in Vocational Agriculture along with their FFA Advisor, Robert Herr, and Homer Luttringer, head of Public Relations for the New Holland Machine Company.

The local chapter members were part of over 10,000 FFA boys from all 50 states of the U.S. representing more than 88,000 FFA members. The group attended all the sessions of the Convention which included business of the National FFA, an FFA Talent Show, the awarding of the highest FFA Degree — The American Farmer Degree — to 382 farm boys, heard the finalists in the public speaking contest, witnessed the honoring of men in all segments of Agribusiness for their help in the Voc Ag Program, and the climax of the program, the naming of the Star Farmer of America. In addition to the convent-

ion, the boys attended the American Royal Livestock Show, visited the Kansas City Stock Yards, toured the American Hereford Association headquarters, visited the Truman Library at Independence and had the unexpected thrill of hearing Harry S. Truman address the FFA members and the opportunity to take pictures of this ex-president.

## Fire Safety While Hunting Is Urgent Need

and Waters Secretary Maurice K. Goddard today directed a special appeal to Pennsylvania's hunters to do their share in preventing forest fires during hunting season.

"Fall hunting season corresponds with one of the two worst fire seasons of the year," Goddard explained, "and unfortunately, most of the fires this time of the year are caused by hunters."

Goddard said that the 1962 spring fire season was one of the worst in many years because of an unbelievable combination of sustained high winds and low humidity in most sections of the Commonwealth.

"It is unlikely that such severe conditions will be repeated this fall," he stated, "but the weather factor is completely unpredictable." "We can avoid serious forest fires," he warned, "if every Pennsylvanian makes up his mind to exercise extreme caution when in the woods and forests."

Goddard said that he hoped that every man, woman, and

child in the Commonwealth would lend their cooperation to the Department of Forests and Waters in preventing forest fires during the remainder of 1962. "Our present goal," he stated, "is to keep the total number of fires this year under the most recent yearly high established in 1952. During that year there were 1653 for-

est fires in Pennsylvania. Thus far in 1962 there have been approximately 1500 fires.

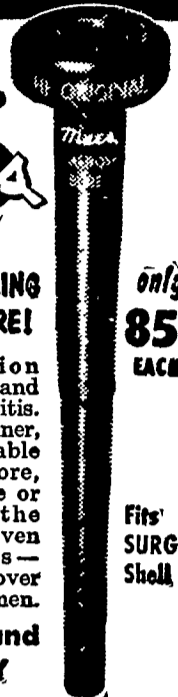
