Six members of the Lancaster County 4-H light horse and pony club will be among the two hundred and thirty-two Pennsylvania boys and girls, all skillful and graceful riders, who today were named to perform in a 2-day horse show at the sixth Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition, Nov. 5-9 in the State Farm Show Building.

Lester A. Burdette, of Penn State University, chairman of the horse show, said they will compete in 21 different events, starting Thursday night, Nov. 8, and finishing the following day. They will be judged by Bradley Bailey, Hilliards, Ohio and J. C. Tischinger, Cockeysville, Md.

The first of the two plots to be harvested is located on the Harold Rohrer farm opposite the Lampeter High School. Husking will begin in that plot at 9 a.m.

At the Paul Minnich farm, Litzitz R3 (near Biubaker's farm machinery shop) the plots will be harvested beginning at 2 p.m.

The plots, termed "the most significant corn variety plots in the country", by a Penn State University agronomist, were started over 30 years ago by retired Associate County Agent, Harry S. Sloat, and have been continued uninterrupted over the years.

Tulips and Daffodils

Tulip and daffodil bulbs can be planted any time from now until the ground is frozen, according to Lynn Smith, Penn State extension floriculturist.

Search Begins For Outstanding Young Farmer

The search for this year's Outstanding Young Farmer is beginning this month as thousands of U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce members begin collecting information on the 1962 accomplishments of the nation's young farmers. Local winners will be named early next year to compete for state and national titles in the spring.

This year, all farmers between the ages of 21 and 36 located in a Jaycee chapter area participating in the program will be judged. Competition is based on farm progress, conservation, and contribution to civic affairs.

More than 1,000 chapters of the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce are expected to participate in the program this year.

Local winners will be recognized in their communities at a Farmer Recognition Program, and honored at their state banquet.

Announcement of the four national winners will be made at a national recognition program in Tulsa next April.

anything to be done about it. And if we (farmers) make a bad mistake in the price of a lot of cattle, we are worse off."

Rishel said he has had little to do with auctions of fat cattle. "I feel we come out a little better when a commission man takes time to deliberate with the ultimate buyer," he said.

Rishel related that he began farming 20 years ago and bought 20 head of choice steers at Lancaster Stock Yards for 15 25 cents a pound. He farms 115 acres on his own farm and rents an additional 100 acres.

The seven farmers at the meeting were in general agreement that the commission men do a good job in the marketing of livestock, but Harold Frey, Marietta R1, said he believes the butcher sometimes is favored by the commission man because the two work closer together than the farmer and the commission man.

Robert Heilbron, president of the Lancaster Livestock Exchange said any fraction of his salt will get the best price for cattle that he is able to get.

Nine members of the Livestock exchange were represented.
