

Grassland Council Sponsors Seed Improvement Meeting, Hay Show

HERSHEY — The Pennsylvania Grassland Council, co-sponsor of the first National Grassland Field Days here in August, will return to Hershey-Nov. 7 for a special program in conjunction with the 44th convention of the International Crop Improvement Association, Dr. John E. Baylor, president, said today.

Baylor, forage crops extension specialist at Penn State University named four speakers for a session starting at 1:30 p.m. — Robert Dye, Yakima, Wash., president of the Washington Crop Improvement Association, Dr. Guy W. McKee and John B. Wash-

ko, research agronomists at Penn State, and Dr. Dayton L. Klingman, Washington, D. C. leader, weed investigations, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Dye will report on storage seed production in his state. McKee and Washko will tell how to achieve successful seedling establishment. Klingman will deal with control of weeds in forage — at seeding time and in established stands.

Eighteen speakers — public officials, regulatory agents, researchers and industry leaders have been named to address the convention of the International Crop Improve-

ment Association.

Included are two state secretaries of agriculture, Dr. William L. Henning, Pennsylvania, and Phillip Alampi, New Jersey. Dr. Henning will address a Pennsylvania breakfast the first morning and will speak again at the convention banquet. Secretary Alampi will talk on adjustments in public relations as part of a seed certification panel presentation geared to changes in agriculture.

At a concurrent business session, ICIA committees will report on general certification, seed stocks, legislation and by-laws, pathological standards, information and cooperation, finance, certified seed promotion, ICIA history, and honorary membership.

The convention, for delegates or seed certification agencies in the United States and Canada, will open with a Pennsylvania Breakfast, 7 a. m., Monday, Nov. 5, and close with a banquet Thursday

night, Nov. 8.

On the program also will be the 1962 Southeastern Pennsylvania District Hay Show Entries will be judged beginning at 1 p.m. on November 6 in the garage of the Hotel Hershey.

The convention embracing the United States and Canada, will be attended by over 300 delegates from seed certification agencies and related institutions. It will review certification and quality control standards and consider revisions in keeping with accelerated adjustments in agriculture.


