## Delmarva Volume Increase Is Irregular

Delmarva reported prices of 12 1/4 to 14 1/4 at farms for 1,063,300 head at farms during the 24 hour period ending 10 30 Friday morning. The bulk of the sales were at 12 1/2 to 13 1/4. Prices included 637,500 head sold at Wednesday's auction at the Eastern Shore Poultry Growers Exchange.

Prices declined slightly during the period with a fair demand and heavy offerings. With practically no plants operating Saturday, estimated slaughter for the week end was 702,000 head compared to the 587,000 head last week end.

The Delmarva broiler-feed ratio for the week ending November 16 was down a full five points from the previous week. Broilers averaged 13 27 per pound and mash cost the grower \$95 23 per ton making the ratio a 2 8 — down from the 3 3 of the previous week when broilers brought 15 59 per pound and mash cost \$95 37.

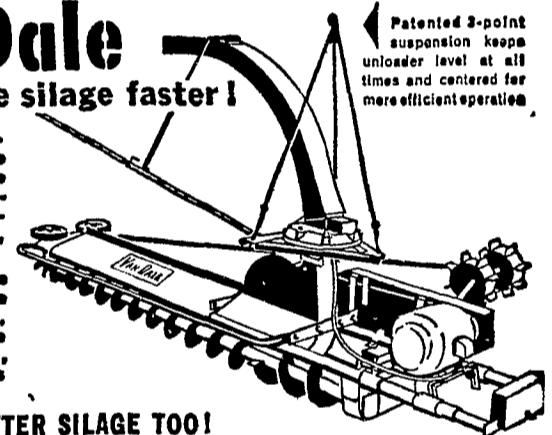

## Why Crops Need Limestone

Two important ingredients needed by crops are calcium and magnesium. Both are regularly lost through the soil by the following ways:

- (1) By leaching, which is a slow leaking away, a normal process where there is rainfall.
- (2) By crop removals, Legumes, such as hay and other greens, are taken off the fields, instead of plowed under.
- (3) By general use of the soil.

Because of this loss, the soil becomes what is known as high in acid. Putting on limestone may supply calcium and magnesium and correct the soil acidity at the same time.

It has been shown in experiments by agricultural colleges and experiment stations that for every dollar spent for limestone, from \$3 to \$15 are returned to the farmer through increased yields.

The U.S. Government is so thoroughly convinced of the worth of applying limestone that about one-half of the cost is granted free when application is made for it. This is to encourage farmers to be certain to use limestone.

It does pay to use limestone!

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
