

Five Countians Receive Awards At Penn State

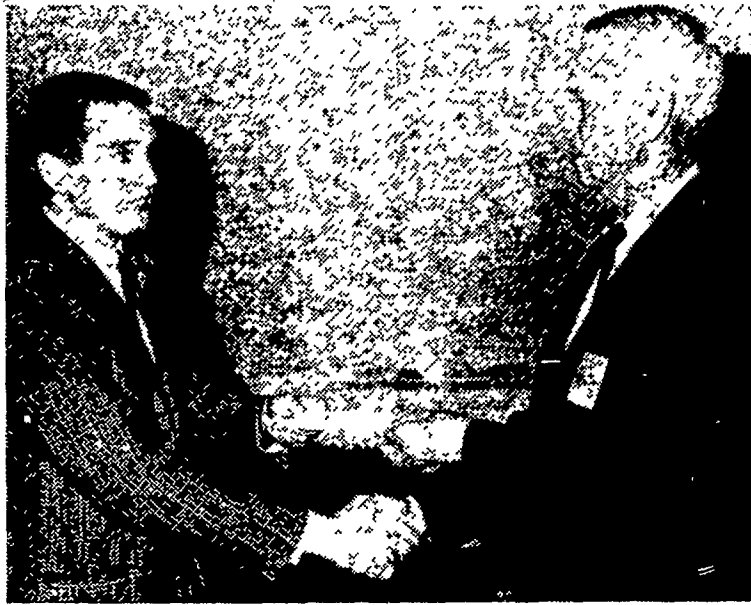
Five Lancaster County residents and two from neighboring counties were among the 103 students receiving scholarship grants at a recent meeting on the campus of the Pennsylvania State University.

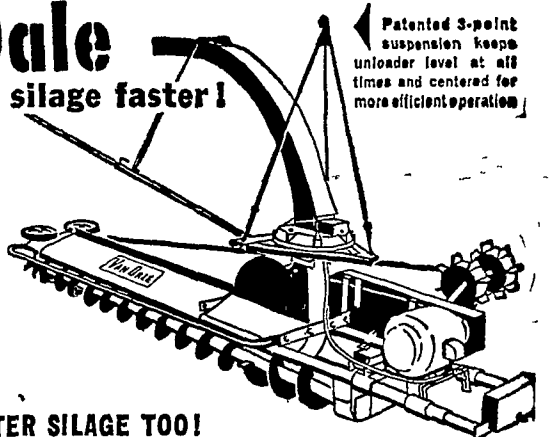
